The Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) Patient-Reported Indicator Surveys Release

Health Canada released a brief on the OECD Patient-Reported Indicator Surveys (PaRIS), which is a groundbreaking initiative where countries work together on developing, standardising and implementing a new generation of indicators that measure the outcomes and experiences of healthcare that matter most to people. The PaRIS survey aims to fill a critical gap in primary healthcare by asking patients about aspects like quality of life, physical functioning, psychological well-being and experiences of healthcare.

As the global population of people living with chronic conditions continues to grow, the need for healthcare systems to adapt to their needs has never been more urgent. PaRIS plays a crucial role in informing this shift by offering data that supports the reorganisation of healthcare by focusing on experiences and health outcomes that matter most to people.

Canada Report

The Canadian Primary Care Research Network (CPCRN) implemented the PaRIS survey across multiple provinces in Canada, including Alberta. The CPCRN would like to acknowledge the support of Health Canada in the development and implementation of the PaRIS Survey in Canada.

PaRIS findings emphasize the need for more people-centred and coordinated care, especially for the 80% of primary care users aged 45 years and older that live with at least one chronic condition and the 50% that live with multiple (two or more) chronic conditions. **You can read more about the results for Canadian primary care here:** Canada Report.
